

FROM CONSTRUCTION TO CONCENTRATE



SUCCESS AT DARGUES GOLD MINE

After a difficult start the to the year, with bushfires devastating much of the region and threatening the local Braidwood and Majors Creek communities, Dargues Gold Mine has reason to celebrate with the production and export of its first gold concentrate in June.

This significant milestone marks the transition of Dargues Gold Mine from a construction project to a fully operating mine, now generating revenue from gold concentrate, in a time of record high gold prices.

Owned by Diversified Minerals, a company associated with PYBAR, Dargues is an exciting 'greenfields' project, and the first new gold mine approved in NSW in over 10 years.

PYBAR provides services to Dargues across the mine, including mining, processing, technical services and administration functions.

The mine is a material net contributor to the local economy and sources the majority of its workforce regionally. The site proactively engages with the local community through a range of mechanisms, including newsletters, an active website, Facebook and a Community Consultative Committee (CCC). It contributes to the region in many ways including purchasing relationships with local suppliers, and offering employment and apprenticeship opportunities to over 100 people on site.



The company has established a Community Grants program with \$10,000 budgeted for FY21. The program seeks to support and enhance local community groups, organisations and infrastructure through grants of up to \$3,000 each. In addition, in February 2020, Dargues partnered with the Braidwood and District Education Foundation (BDEF) for a local education scholarship for a Majors Creek student. The Dargues Gold Mine Scholarship was awarded to local Majors Creek resident, Jessie Kay, who completed Year 12 in 2018.

"We value our place as part of the community," said Shannon Green, Dargues General Manager.

"We are proud of what we have achieved at Dargues so far and we will continue to contribute to the community over many years to come," he said.



Underground Operations

When Diversified Minerals took ownership of Dargues in June 2016 the only infrastructure on site was a handful of portable office buildings and the surface boxcut excavation to the face of the portal, which had not yet been commenced.

PYBAR was appointed as mining contractor, and once the appropriate regulatory approvals were in place, set about installing surface infrastructure and commencing development of the decline and underground mine.

Underground production followed, and the first ore was delivered to the surface ROM pad in May 2019, in readiness for completion of the ore processing plant.

Ore Processing Plant

Construction of the ore processing plant got underway in December 2018, and following a series of commissioning phases, the plant commenced full production in June this year.

The processing plant consists of two main parts; a three-stage crushing and milling circuit which reduces the size of the rock mined from underground to a fine, sandy powder and a flotation circuit which separates off the sulphides containing the gold and leaves behind the waste rock.





What Happens Next?

The gold concentrate produced by the Dargues ore processing plant is then transported via road to the Goulburn rail siding, where it is loaded onto trains for rail transport to the Port Kembla Gateway ship loading facility. From there, the concentrate makes its way to various ports around the world to satisfy the demand for gold in jewellery, industrial applications and financial investment purposes.

Members of the senior management team were on hand to witness loading of the first shipment of Dargues gold concentrate in June; the culmination of the efforts of many people over the last few years.

Paul Rouse, PYBAR Group Executive Chairman said: "The Dargues Gold Mine team and contractors involved during the construction of this world-class mine and ore processing plant have performed a tremendous task.

"From a construction site in 2017 to producing and selling gold concentrate today is a momentous achievement for the Dargues team and everyone involved."

PYBAR'S RAISE BORE DIVISION KICKING GOALS

PYBAR's Raise Bore Division is going from strength to strength, with new projects in New South Wales, Queensland, and a contract extension for our current works in South Australia.

Our Raise Bore Division is also expanding our services to Western Australia, and we can now offer our Western Australian clients a range of vertical development services.

Our vertical development capabilities now include slot drilling, raise drilling, supply and installation of escape ways and rising mains, shaft lining services and shaft scanning services with LiDAR (light detection and ranging).

The LiDAR technology is provided by PYBAR's technology partner, Digital Terrain, using the Emesent Hovermap AL0 unit with a protective cage to conduct pre and post shaft scans for surface and underground ventilation shafts. In May, an Australian first was achieved by scanning a raise bore shaft in preparation for our shaft-lining unit.

PYBAR's Raise Bore Division is now able to provide QA data validation for reamed ventilation shafts and shaft lining services with a high degree of accuracy.

DRILLING RECORDS BROKEN AT COWAL GOLD OPERATION

PYBAR AND HMR SETTING THE STANDARD

The Cowal Gold Operation project continues to shine with drilling records climbing.

Following the successful completion of the Warraga decline project at Cowal Gold Operation by PYBAR in January, our client, Evolution Mining, asked PYBAR to stay on and oversee the next stage of the GRE46 Exploration Project.

Sister company, HMR Drilling Services has been on site for the past year with initially two underground drilling rigs, followed by a third, performing exploration drilling services to a safe and professional standard which embodies our values of SAFETY, SERVICE, RESPECT and RESULTS.

In May, a new site record was achieved, with an impressive 6,697m drilled for the month, exceeding target by 562m. In one 12-hour shift 155.4m was drilled by Adam Hinton, Driller and Dominic Fowler, Driller's Assistant, breaking previous records for both the site and HMR. A special thanks goes out to the rest of the HMR team, Rhys Coleman, Tyson Vos, Gavin Henderson and Brett McKenzie, for demonstrating the benefits of good cross-shift set up and handover practices.



PYBAR TO TRIAL DASH CAMS IN UNDERGROUND EQUIPMENT

With the increasing prevalence of dashboard cameras, known as dash cams, across the wider community, and the need to maintain focus on improving safety performance, PYBAR is set to install dash cam technology in underground equipment in a first for the company.

Dash cams are in widespread use across the world, and the technology has already been adopted by many private vehicle operators as well as industry, with some sectors now moving to the use of body cameras. It is only a matter of time before dash cam technology will become an accepted part of any workplace where mobile equipment is in use.

SHET Manager, Rob Patterson, said that the main driver for PYBAR to commence the trial is to build upon the improvement in safety performance experienced over the past few years.

"The use of emerging dash cam technology has the potential to deliver real improvements in injury prevention by identifying behaviour which leads to incidents, as well as helping to reduce equipment damage and the associated downtime and costs," he said.

"We can also see dash cams playing a significant role in incident and accident investigations where mobile equipment is involved."

Dargues Gold Mine will see the first of the cameras installed in selected underground equipment in the near future. The dash cams will have the capability to record activities and sound inside and outside the cabin which will provide valuable information on how incidents occur and how they can be avoided. Other project sites will be selected for further trials of the technology following analysis of the initial trial results.

SHAPING THE FUTURE OF VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING

ROY WALSH INVITED TO SIT ON NATIONAL MINING SKILLS ORGANISATION PILOT WORKING GROUP

With the appointment of AIM's Roy Walsh to the national Mining Skills Organisation Pilot, the mining industry has an opportunity to help create a better vocational education training system across Australia.

Roy Walsh, RTO Manager of the Australian Institute of Mining (AIM), the RTO established by PYBAR to deliver quality, nationally-recognised training for the underground mining sector, has been invited to take part in shaping the future of Vocational Education Training (VET) nationally as a member of the recently formed Mining Skills Organisation Pilot Working Group.

The Australian Government's \$585.3M Skills Package, announced in 2019, includes funding for three Skills Organisations; one of which is the recently formed Mining Skills Organisation Pilot.

The Pilots will work to strengthen VET across Australia, by ensuring it is responsive, flexible and valued by industry, providing learners with the skills needed to succeed in modern workplaces, and equipping workers with the skills required by employers to grow the mining industry into the future as new technologies are introduced. VET training for the mining industry includes apprenticeships, traineeships, skills sets and Certificate I, II, III, IV and diploma level training packages.

The Pilot, initially chaired by the Minerals Council of Australia, a major advocate for more flexible, higher quality and responsive training and workforce development, will work to identify skills needed and provide advice to the Department of Education, Skills and Employment on qualifications development and improvements in training delivery and assessment for the industry.

"The establishment of the Mining Skills Organisation Pilot presents a real opportunity for the mining industry to shape the future of vocational education in Australia, which will then in turn meet the needs of our industry," said Roy Walsh.



"Quality and responsive education, training and workforce development are crucial to ensuring skilled workers enter and remain in the mining industry, ensuring its growth and sustainability into the future."


April 2020 - Natalie McLeish
